Tips for Driving in the Fall

Watch out for school trafficwe all know to watch for school buses, school zones, and kids at cross walks. Even if you're

driving through rural country roads, it's important to pay close attention to 'school bus stop ahead' road traffic signs. Be prepared to



stop for buses dropping off or picking up students.

- Keep an eye out for farmers and equipment- Harvest season is upon us. Give farm equipment their space on the roads and do not pass unless it is safe to do so.
- Check your headlights and taillights- We are losing daylight and it is important to make sure you are always visible!
- · Be cautious of foliage debris-Leaves that are on the road or piled on the side of the street can be some of the most dangerous fall driving hazards. Wet leaves stick to the pavement and make it as slippery as ice. Dry leaves can

conceal potholes, bumps, ice, puddles and other hazards. Drive through leaves the same way you would on ice or snow:

 Increase your following distance.

> Look to see if the leaves are glistening with moisture when light hits them.

• Look for moving animals- Animals are looking for new habitat and deer start to move.

- **Prepare for fog-** Fall mornings are much cooler creating fog. Make sure your windshield and windows are clear before rolling. Also slow down as you will have reduced visibility.
- Take extra care when coupling your trailer- When the weather gets cold, the grease on the fifth wheel thickens up. This means it may take more time for the jaws to engage when hooking up to a trailer. Be patient when hooking your trailers. Always make sure you hear the jaws are fully engaged before driving away
